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## **MORE THAN JUST A NAME**



I'm sure we have all had those restless nights where we toss and turn, until attempting the old 'counting sheep' routine. When we are really desperate, we may try reading First Chronicles where the endless list of names usually produces yawns and droopy eyelids. It's easy for us to forget that these difficult-to-pronounce names represent relationships; real, living relationships with both man and God.

In the New Testament, the Apostle Paul, on a few occasions, also gives us a list of names, albeit much shorter than those in Chronicles. Some of the people Paul lists as just names; but eve-

ry so often Paul pulls back the curtain, giving us a quick glimpse of their lives and their relationship to him and the church. Let us attempt to not only see what Paul saw in this particular name, but hopefully be encouraged, yes, even determined to become such a vessel.

The name Epaphras appears three times in only five verses in Paul's letters of Colossians and Philemon.

Philemon 1:23 tells us Epaphras is a fellowprisoner with Paul; which was a very small circle of relationship, having only three other members. It reveals Epaphras was not only willing to suffer and pay a price for the Gospel, but he indeed did so. In Colossians 1:7,8 Epaphras is declared as a dear or beloved fellowservant. Notice again the sense of identification or fellowship with Paul. Here he is also said to be a faithful minister of Christ. Faithfulness to Christ extends itself as faithfulness to His people; just as commitment to The Lord's body is a reflection of a prior commitment to Him. These qualities in Epaphras are seeds of the expression of ministry that follows in the third passage.

Colossians 4:12,13 shows Epaphras as the only one of Paul's friends and coworkers commended for his intercessory prayer ministry. Paul says, "who is one of you." I believe this is not just revealing that Epaphras was from the city of Colosse, but that, like the incarnation of Jesus, Epaphras fully identified with those for whom he prayed. Paul says that Epaphras is a servant of Christ. The word for servant is the Greek word doulos, or bondslave, a word Paul often used to describe himself, but only used to describe two others, Timothy and Epaphras. Because Epaphras is a doulos he is "always laboring fervently for you in prayers." The Greek phrase 'laboring fervently' is agonizomai, from which we get the English, to agonize. These

were not quick prayers but strenuous times of interceding on the behalf of others. Epaphras brings to mind our High Priest who is touched by the feelings of our infirmities and ever lives to make intercession for us. The name Epaphras means lovely, which is fitting because he revealed true love in sacrificial service to Christ and to His body.

We currently live in a day of so-called 'relevant' and trendy names for churches or conferences, such as Innovate, Mosaic, Impact, or Journey, that have very little relevance to Christ. I'm pretty sure that no one will be naming a church after Epaphras anytime soon, but maybe they should.

These scattered thoughts came to me as I



stood by the hospital bed of Donald Doyle. Just a name that's on his wristband for the attending caregivers to read, but much more than just a

name to His Savior, his family, his church family and me.

#### The Claudius Stone, Bulgaria

Nineteen years ago it was prophesied that Ric and I would travel and minister in Europe. This was the year that it happened. Our brother Tom Worth has been traveling to Bulgaria for I believe about twenty years so the path had already been made. Ric, as a Bible School teacher, also taught some of these brethren. In God's perfect timing He opened up for us a wide door of effectual ministry.

It has only been about thirty years since Bulgaria had come out of the control of communism. Which means the church is relatively young. The need for sound Biblical teaching is apparent to them and to the glory of God we were embraced and found favor wherever we went. In their city of Silistra there were actual ruins of a church that commemorated the death of martyrs for Christianity first came to Bulgar-



ia in the third century. There is even a stone marker within a short walk from our hotel called the Claudius stone, the same Claudius named in Acts 11 & 18. There has always been a people of God in Bulgaria even withstanding the oppressive spirit of communism.

#### THE CHRISTIAN **DUROSTORUM-DRASTAR**



Silistra, the antique Durostorum the Middle Age Drastar, Sillstra, the antique Durostorum the Middle Age Drastar, is amongst the leading centers of Christianity, Christian culture and civilization in Dobroudja. Here from the end of the 3rd the beginning of the 4th c. there was an early Christian community, in which brighten up the 12 saints, who died as martyrs between the years 303 and 362. Material evidence of their martyr history is two martyr temples and a grave, in which a golden ring with early Christian symptols were found.


The martyr glory of Durostorum is a base for creating a bishop desk about the year 380, which was leaded by Merkurian-Auxentius, a student of the apostle of the Cotts Ulfila. In the mere centre of the city were raised basilicas and a bishop's palace. With the arrival of the Asparuh's proto-Bulgarians in the end of the 7th century was set the end of the early Christian past of Durostorum. The early Middle Age Drastar became a pagan center, for which is evidence the temple of Tangra from the 9th century and several sacrificial altars, which were found in the city.

After the conversion of the Bulgarians in 865 Drastar became again a bishop center, which was headed by bishop Nikolay, for whom we have the evidence of an inscription from the year 870 and seals. Then on the shore of the Danube was raised a cathedral basilica and western from it a residence. In 927 the Drastar bishop Damian became the first Bulgarian patriarch. The cathedral basilica was reconstructed into a patriarchal behive temple; the residence became a patriarchal castle. Here in the 11th-12th c. found residence the Byzatarite bishops, and in the 13th-14th c. the Bulgarian match the 15th to the end of the 19th c.

### **CHANGING OUR GARMENT**

Ephesians 4:11-And he gave some, apostles; some, prophets; and some, evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers;

Exodus 35: 30-35 speaks of two men, Bezaleel-which means in the shadow of God-and Aholiab-which means tent of his father, dwelling place, or tabernacle- being able to function in whatever capacity that was needed at that time. There are three sets of five in this scripture. The first set is verse 31-wisdom, understanding, knowledge, all manner of workmanship, and verse 34 teach. The second set is in verses 32 and 33-gold, silver, brass, stone, and wood. The third set of five is in verse 35-engraver, cunning workman, embroiderer, weaver, and of them that do devise cunning work. These two could function in whatever capacity that was needed at that moment. They were not stuck saying I am one thing and can't do anything else. Too many people get stuck today in a mold and do not want or accept change. God could tell them to do something else, but because they hate change they do not respond to God. It is more than just a five-fold principle, it is a daily principle of not being willing for God to move them in a new direction. Are you like that? We need to examine our hearts.

Ezekiel 1:12 says and they went every one straight forward: whither the spirit was to go, they went; and they turned not when they went. Are we allowing the Spirit of God to truly lead and guide? Do we embrace change or stay in a same path when we know God wants us to change direction? Do we accept when God changes seasons in our lives? I live in a college town. It could be dead of winter and the students are wearing shorts. They love the summer and don't want to let it go. Are any of us like that with our spiritual seasons-holding on and not changing our garments?

Can we accept change when it makes no sense? Look at Philip in Acts 8. He was doing miracles, unclean spirits coming out of people, healings, preaching. Great things were happening, and God tells him to go to the desert. He was to leave a great revival where he was being mightily used and go to the desert. He was not told why he was to go. There was no reason given. Verse 27 says and he arose and went. No questions asked. We know the rest of the story. The gospel was taken to Ethiopia because of his obedience, and Ethiopia was changed dramatically. What if he hadn't gone? Will you go? Will you change your garments for a new season in your life and see God do things you never thought of? In Genesis 24, Abraham's servant was sent to find a bride for Isaac. He found Rebekah and gave her new raiment for the trip, and her family proceeded to hold her back. Abraham's servant had to hear it from Rebekah's lips as her brethren asked her will you go. And she said I will go. One translation says I am ready. Are you ready for God to give you a new garment for your journey? It was a 450 mile journey, dangerous, on camelback, no Dramamine. It took about 30 days. And yet in verse 67, we see that Isaac loved her. Had she not taken that journey she would not have known his love. Likewise, our being obedient to do what we know we are to do, will show us greater depths of Jesus' love for us. Will you go?

I have a friend who everyone was telling him that he was called to be a pastor. He desired to be a pastor, but there was no open door. He was in a church where there was one pastor and two assistants. The Lord spoke to me that the main pastor was to resign, but he was waiting knowing he was to resign. Eventually, he did resign, and my friend became one of the assistants. So I asked him if what I had heard was right. He said the pastor admitted holding on even though he knew he was to leave. By his holding on, he was hindering the call on my friend's life. Could we be holding anyone back by our holding on to an old garment too long?

Genesis 41:14-Then Pharaoh sent and called Joseph, and they brought him hastily out of the dungeon; and he shaved himself, and changed his raiment... Things happen quickly sometimes. He changed raiment to see Pharaoh. How much more should we want to change raiment in obedience to God? In verse 42, look at his last change of raiment-ring-linen-gold chain-which is his 5<sup>th</sup> change.

Benjamin, the son of the right hand, the last son of Jacob, was given five portions in Genesis 42:34.

'As the mountains are around Jerusalem, so the Lord is round about His people from henceforth even forever.
